PRESIDENT ROBERTS' MESSAGE TO MEMBERSHIP

The following is the text of the annual letter from the National President of Eta Sigma Phi:

FOUR NEW CHAPTERS INSTALLED

GAMMA IOTA

Gamma Iota Chapter was installed at Wabash College, Crawfordsville, Indiana, on May 23, 1954. The installation ceremonies were administered by Professor Vergil E. Hiatt and members of Beta Mu Chapter, Butler University. Eight students were initiated into active membership. Professor John F. Charles was made an honorary member. Professor Theodore Bedrick, adviser of the new chapter, is a member of Eta Sigma Phi, and was adviser of the chapter at the University of Illinois for several years.

GAMMA KAPPA

Gamma Kappa Chapter was installed at Heidelberg College, Tiffin, Ohio, on May 14, 1954. ETA SIGMA PHI CONTESTS FOR 1955

For 1954 - 1955, Eta Sigma Phi, national undergraduate honorary classical fraternity, announces the following four Contests. Further information may be had from the Chairman of Contests, W. C. Korfmacher, Saint Louis University, 3647 West Pine Boulevard, Saint Louis 8, Missouri.

1) Tenth Annual Essay Contest:

(a) Subject: "Homer, Father of Western Epic Verse."

(b) Eligibility: The Contest is open to college undergraduates, enrolled at the time of submission of the paper in a course of Greek or Latin in an approved college or university in the United States or Canada.

(c) Identification: Each paper submitted is to be accompanied by an identification page, available in advance from the Chairman of Contests, giving necessary information and including a testimonial from a member of the classics faculty at the contestant's school as to the contestant's right to participate and his fair and original preparation of the paper. There is a limit of five papers from any one school.

(d) Qualifications: All papers must be original. Sincerity and definiteness will be especially considered. Quotations must be duly credited. Format, mode of citation, and the like, must be uniform within the paper. Entries must be typewritten, in double space, on one side only of normal - sized typewriter paper. The maximum length is 2,250 words.

(e) Dates: Written notice of a desire to participate, postmarked not later than February 1, 1955, must be sent to the Chairman of Contests. Entries themselves, similarly sent, must be postmarked not later than February 15, 1955.

(f) Decision: Decision as to place will be made by an expert judge, who will identify the papers by code designation only.

(g) Prizes: First, \$50.00; second, \$35.00; third, \$25.00; fourth, \$17.50; fifth, \$12.50; sixth, \$10.00. For its full award, the Contest will require a minimum of fifteen entries, from fifteen different schools.

2) Sixth Annual Greek Translation Contest:

(a) Content: The Contest will consist in the sight translation of a passage in Greek chosen with an eye to students in the second year of the language or above. Translations will be written in a two-hour period, under normal examination

regulations, in each contestant's own school.

(b) Eligibility: The Contest is open to college undergraduates, enrolled at the time of participation in a course in Greek language in an approved college or university in the United States or Canada.

(c) Identification: Each paper submitted is to be accompanied by an identification page, as in the Essay Contest. There is a limit of five papers from any one school.

(d) Dates: Written notice of a desire to participate, postmarked not later than February 1, 1955, must be sent to the Chairman of Contests, who will mail the Contest material in time for the contest day. The Contest will be administered simultaneously in all the participating schools on February 8, 1955. Entries themselves, addressed to the Chairman of Contests, must be postmarked not later than February 15, 1955.

(e) Decision: Decision as to place will be made by an expert judge, who will identify the papers by code designation only.

(f) Prizes: Six prizes will be offered, as in the Essay Contest, except that any participant placing in both events will receive an added award equal to that won in the Greek Translation Contest. For its full award, the Contest will require a minimum of fifteen entries, from fifteen different schools.

3) Fifth Annual Satterfield Latin Translation Contest:

(a) Content: The Contest will consist in the original translation of a passage in Latin to be supplied on request by the Chairman of Contests. Translations will be written as normal "out-of-class" work, not as examinations.

(b) Eligibility: The Contest is open to college undergraduates, enrolled at the time of participation in an approved college or university in the United States or Canada.

(c) Identification: Each paper submitted is to be accompanied by an identification page, as in the Essay Contest. There is a limit of five papers from any one school.

(d) Dates: Written notice of a desire to participate, postmarked not later than February 1, 1955, must be sent to the Chairman of Contests, who will mail the Contest material in ample time for the closing date. Entries themselves, similarly sent, must be postmarked not later than February 15, 1955.

GAMMA LAMBDA

be made by an expert judge, who will identify the papers by code designation only.

(f) Prize: A prize of \$25.00 will be given for the best paper.

4) Fourth Annual Chapter Foreign Language Census:

(a) Content: The Contest will consist in a report of foreign language credits held by college undergraduates, and these credits will be totalled (with weightings in favor of Greek, Latin, Sanskrit, and Hebrew) according to a system to be sent on request, by the Chairman of Contests.

(b) Eligibility: The Contest is among chapters of Eta Sigma Phi Fraternity, and hence reports will be accepted only from college undergraduates who are chapter members and attending the college or university to which the chapter belongs.

(c) Identification: Each report submitted must be signed by the faculty sponsor of the chapter to which the entrant belongs. A chapter may send as many entries as it wishes, but only one award will be given any one chapter.

(d) Dates: Written notice of a desire to participate, postmarked not later than February 1, 1955, must be sent to the Chairman of Contests. Entries themselves, similarly sent, must be postmarked not later than February 15, 1955.

(e) Decision: As decision on place is a matter merely of mathematical calculation, it will be handled in the office of the Chairman of Contests.

(f) Prizes: For the chapter reporting a student with the highest number of points, \$25.00, second, \$15.00; third, \$10.00.



SOUTHERN SECTION OF CAMWS TO HOLD THANKSGIVING MEETING

"Dorothy Ann Jaquith, Beta Alpha's prytanis of 1953 and delegate to the Bloomington convention, has been selected in national competition to receive a Fulbright Scholarship to study classics

at the University of London next year. She will sail for England in September and expects to specialize in a study of Catullus. It is noteworthy that two of the three Fulbright Scholarships allotted to South Dakota this spring went to students of the classics: Dorothy Jaquith, to study Latin in London; Nitsea Rallis, graduate of Augustana, to study Greek History in Athens. Three of Beta Alpha's four graduating seniors were elected to Phi Beta Kappa and are graduating with honors: Craig Staudenbaur, summa cum laude, holder of a \$1700 fellowship to do graduate work in philosophy at Brandeis University, Waltham, Mass, and recipient of the Arthur L. Keith Memorial prize in Greek at South Dakota; Dorothy Jaquith, magna cum laude; Mary Jane Gunderson, magna cum laude, now leading the freshman class in medicine at the University. John Wicks, freshman and recent initiate of Beta Alpha Chapter, is holder of the Frederick Angier Spafford Memorial Prize in Vergil, established many years ago by the South Dakota Medical Association. The University's Experimental Theater this spring produced, with marked success, "The Glass House," an original three act comedy by Howard Fulweiler, current prytanis of Beta Alpha and one of the essay winners, two years ago, of Eta Sigma Phi's essay contest."

BETA LAMBDA, MARYMOUNT COLLEGE

Sister Marie Antoinette, Faculty Adviser of Beta Lambda, announces the initiation of two new members in October. At the September meeting she gave her group an account of the Catacombs in Rome. The chapter is planning regular monthly meetings for the remainder of the year.

reward for the best tests was an Eta Sigma Phi four-year medal.

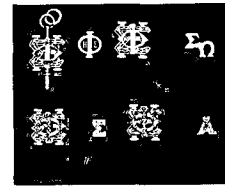
GAMMA DELTA, YESHIVA UNIVERSITY

An excellent report of last year's activities in Gamma Delta Chapter was received from Manfred Fulda, Prytanis of the chapter. The chapter got off to a good start, he says, at its first meeting on November 17 at which Dr. Simeon L. Guterman, newly appointed Dean of Yeshiva College and Professor of History, spoke on the subject "Religious Tolerance in Roman Times." Preceding the main lecture talks were given by Manfred Fulda on "The Lasting Contributions of Greece and Rome to Civilization," and Milton Freundlich on "The Need for a Classical Society at a College."

At a meeting on December 9, Joseph Kaplan, a classics student, spoke on "Pompeii." Following the lecture, slides and mounted pictures, a gift of Professor Floch to the chapter's classical museum, were shown. On December 30 Dr. Alexander Litman, Professor of Philosophy at Yeshiva College, lectured on "Some Reflections on Aeschylus and Sophocles." Spirited discussion followed.

"What Makes the Study of Foreign Languages Easy or Difficult, in the Light of Modern Linguistics," was the subject of an informative lecture by Joseph Urivetsky, a senior student in Greek, at the first meeting in March. On March 24 Morton Geftter, another student, spoke on "The Translation Problem."

On May 26 Gamma Delta held its second anniversary celebration and third annual initiation. The meeting opened with the singing of Gaudeamus Igitur, followed by an address by Manfred Fulda on "The Significance of the Classical Tradition." Alex Hoffer, also a classics student, spoke on "The Pre-Medical Student and the Humanities in General, and the Classics in Particular." Initiation of 16 new active members and three new honorary members followed. Those elected to honorary membership were: Dr. Simeon Leonard Guterman, Dean of Yeshiva College; Rabbi Dr. Leo Jung, Professor of Ethics and Philosophy; and Dr. Manfred Halberstadt, Professor of Greek and Latin. Manfred Fulda, who has been a most effective and conscientious head of the chapter since its inception, turned over the presidency of the chapter to his successor, Nathan Lewin. 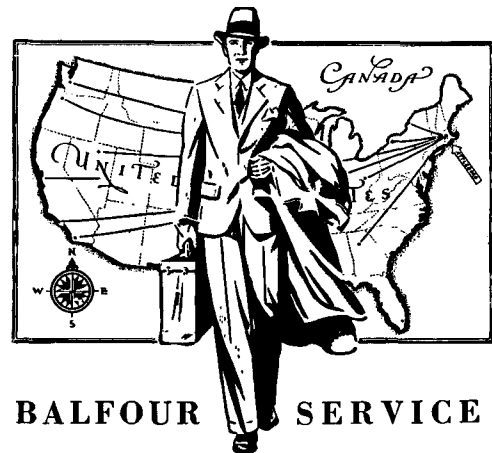
