Thirty-seventh National Convention March 26 and 27

The Thirty-seventh National Convention will be held March 26 and 27, 1965, at Richmond, Virginia. The dates originally announced have been changed, inasmuch as they were inconvenient for the host chapters. The convention hotel will be the Richmond, located in the downtown area of the city. Host chapters for the convention will be the chapters of the state of Virginia: Omega, the College of William and Mary, of which Janet Sheets is Prytanis; Beta Theta, Hampden-Sydney College, whose Prytanis is Gordon Dalton Schreck; Beta Nu Chapter, Mary Washington College, which Prytanis Lynne Bayles directs; and Delta Alpha, Randolph-Macon Woman's College, over which Prytanis Margaret Phillips presides. Advisers of the chapters, in the order above, are Professor George J. Ryan, Professor Graves H. Thompson, Professor Laura V. Sumner, and Professor Robert B. Lloyd.


The business sessions of the conven-

tion, beginning with the first session on Friday morning, will be held in the Richmond. This hotel will also be the location of the annual banquet. It is expected that Mr. Robert Karl Bohm who was the Eta Sigma Phi Scholar at the American Academy in Rome last summer will be the speaker at the banquet. Mr. Bohm, an alumnus of Alpha Rho Chapter of Muhlenberg College, is now a student at Princeton Seminary.


On Friday afternoon, immediately after lunch, the members of the convention will visit Colonial Williamsburg, which is about an hour's drive from Richmond. A Greyhound bus will provide transportation for those who desire to go in this way at a minimum cost of about \$1.00. The guided tour of the reconstructed city will be \$1.50. Williamsburg was first occupied in 1633 and after a fire leveled Jamestown in 1698 the capital was moved the following year to this site, which was now renamed Williams-

burg, in honor of William III of England. Prior to this, in 1693, the College of William and Mary was founded at this location and between 1695 and 1698 the Wren Building was built at the center of the College yard from a design of Sir Christopher Wren. It is said to be the oldest academic building in English America. Williamsburg played a part in the lives of Washington, Jefferson, George Mason, Patrick Henry, George Wythe, Peyton Randolph, and many other leaders of our country. Williamsburg was restored and reconstructed through the efforts of the Reverend W. A. R. Goodwin, the late Rector of Bruton Parish, and John D. Rockefeller, Jr. A visit to Williamsburg is an opportunity to relive, in imagination at least, some of the early years of our country's history.

Richmond itself is a historic city. It was first visited in 1607, according to historical records, and a trading post was founded here in 1637. In 1780 it replaced Williamsburg as the capital

of the state and in 1861 it became the capital of the Confederacy. Across from the Hotel Richmond stands the capitol building, designed by Thomas Jefferson under the inspiration of the Maison Carree at Nimes, France, a former Roman temple. The building houses Houdon's statue of George Washington. Nearby is St. Paul's Church, where Jefferson Davis was worshipping when he was told that somebody named Grant was outside the city and it was time to leave. In the city also are St. John's Church, scene of Patrick Henry's "Liberty or Death" speech, and the home of Chief Justice John Marshall. Monument Avenue commemorates many famous men of the past. Richmond is rich in

educational institutions, since it is the location of the University of Richmond, founded in 1830, the Medical College of Virginia, Union Theological Seminary of the Presbyterian Church and Virginia Union University of the Baptist Church.


PETITION

A petition for a charter to found a chapter of Eta Sigma Phi on the campus of Illinois State University at Normal has been received from the Latin Club of that institution. The Latin Club was founded in 1919 and at the present time it has a membership of thirty-four. The program for this year included among other items a trip to the Classical Museum at the University of Illinois and a Roman banquet. Illinois State University at Normal was established in 1857 by the State of Illinois. It is a fully accredited institution of higher education. At the present time the enrollment in the regular session is about 7000 and the summer session has an enrollment of approximately 3000. There are seventy-five students enrolled in the Department of Classics at the present time and the University offers only courses in Latin. The faculty of the Department has three members. The petition is signed by thirty-four students and approved by the Head of the Department of Foreign Languages, Chairman of the Latin Section of the Department of Foreign Languages, and the Dean of the Undergraduate School.

Delta Lambda Chapter of Eta Sigma Phi was installed at the College of the Holy Cross, Worcester, Massachusetts, on May 17, 1964. Ten charter members were intiated into the Fraternity at this time. The installation ceremony was conducted by Professor Thomas H. Corcoran of Tufts University, who was formerly Adviser of Tau Chapter. A large audience was present for the ceremony, since the installation of our new chapter was the highpoint of the Eighth Annual Examination of the Hellenic Seminar.

Delta Lambda Chapter was organized by the Reverend Joseph M.-F. Marique, S. J., and Dr. Gerard B. Lavery of the Department of Classics. Mr. Robert H. Meyer, Prytanis of the new chapter, was President of the club Ereuna, from which the chapter was formed. This club, organized in 1964,

had as its program a series of lectures on the campus of the College and excursions to other campuses to meet eminent scholars.

The College of the Holy Cross is a liberal arts college, founded in 1843. Greek and Latin have been emphasized at the College since its founding. The study of the Classics in the original languages was required of all students for some length of time and until quite recently Latin was a requirement for the A. B. degree. Presently, however, students who are more interested in other disciplines are freed from the obligation to study Latin. Although this has reduced the number of students who study Classics, those who are still in the program are involved to a much greater extent than former students. There is a wide range of courses offered in the Department of

Classics to interest the student who desires a broad education and the library of 200,000 volumes offers wide opportunities. For a number of years the College emphasized the curricula for pre-medical and pre-law studies, but in more recent years the curriculum of the school has been revised to include other fields and to allow greater freedom of electives.

The College of the Holy Cross has an enrollment of about two thousand students. At the time of the installation of our new chapter there the Department of Classics had a faculty of fourteen with a student enrollment of over six hundred. The greatest number of these was enrolled in courses in Latin, but over two hundred were in Greek and a smaller number in courses in Classics in translation.

Officers of Delta Lambda Chapter for this year are Prytanis Robert H. Meyer, Hyparchos Harold B. Schramm, Grammateus Francis I. Morrissey, and Chrysophylax P. Darwin Miscall. Dr. Gerard B. Lavery of the Department of Classics is the Adviser of the chapter. The officers have planned an extensive program of lectures for the rest of this year with the cooperation of the Cross and Scroll Society, of which Hyparchos Harold Schramm is Chairman. The chapter also has an ambition to improve the quality of secondary instruction in Latin in its area.

DELTA LAMBDA College of the Holy Cross


