MINUTES

OF THE FORTY-FOURTH NATIONAL CONVENTION ETA SIGMA PHI FRATERNITY

Tiffin, Ohio March 10 and 11, 1972

The Forty-Fourth National Convention of Eta Sigma Phi Fraternity convened in Tiffin, Ohio, upon the invitation of Gamma Kappa chapter, Heidelberg College on March 10 and 11, 1972.

The First General Session was called to order by Megas Prytanis Stephen Bumgarner in the Great Hall of the Campus Center. Prytanis Della Louise Coon of Heidelberg College extended an address of welcome to the convention delegates and this was followed by a response from Megas Hyparchos Alexander Graham Jr.

Megas Prytanis Stephen Bumgarner opened the business meeting with a request for the reading of the minutes for the Forty-Third National Convention. It was moved and seconded and passed to dispense with the reading. Megas Grammateus Rosalyn Kulick then called the Roll of Chapters. Fifteen chapters responded, and delegates from each chapter in attendance read the annual reports of their chapters and then presented these reports and their credentials for permanent filing. Two chapters, unable to send delegates to the convention, sent in chapter reports to be filed along with the others.

Megas Chrysophylax Robert Rhodehamel was unable to attend the convention due to illness so the Report of the Hyparchos Alexander Graham Jr. The report was approved pending the findings of the Auditing Committee.

Professor Theodore Bedrick then presented the Report of the Board of Trustees. An account of the incestments made during the past year was given. Eta Sigma Phi presently has \$2,500.00 in savings bonds. Shares in Investor Mutual increased over the past year. A total of \$6,894.73 remains in the savings account. It was moved, seconded, and passed to accept the Report. Professor Bedrick announced that the Fraternity is no longer in

financial jeopardy. He also noted that the \$10,000.00 bequeated by the late Miss Maurine Dallas Watkins was received on March 6, 1972.

Dr. Mary Ann Burns, the Executive Secretary then presented the Report of the Executive Secretary to the Convention. She announced that four chapters had become inactive, leaving seventy-four chapters on the Roll of Active Chapters.

The Report of the Committee on Eta Sigma Phi contests was postponed because the contests had not been held yet.

AMERICAN SCHOOL

Every person who visits Greece comes back with enthusiastic reports about the beautiful landscapes, the generous and friendly people, the great food, and the good times to be enjoyed at archaeological sites or beaches or nightspots or whatever the individual prefers. I can certainly be no exception; Greece is a "beautiful" place, in every sense of the word, and merits every compliment ever paid it. To spend any length of time there is, indeed, to have a dream come true.

It is difficult to single out only a few items to mention to prospective visitors or members of the American School at Athens. The summer session itself is spent touring many of the major archaeological sites and museums on the mainland and the islands (we visited Crete and Samos) and hearing lectures by experts with a variety of interests. Each member of our group was also responsible for two oral reports which were given "on the spot" throughout the summer. It was quite a change to be lecturing while standing on or pointing to the element in question instead of referring to a slide. An optional examination was given at the end.

There were many memorable classical and personal moments in the course of the summer. It may sound corny, but when you see a piece of statuary that has just been uncovered after centuries of burial, you have an eery and awesome awareness of the melding of past and present. When we approached Delphi, the presence of the god seemed almost evident. The sheer cliffs were wreathed in gray mists and clouds. Jagged peaks appeared only occasionally as the sun reflected kaleidoscopically through the clouds. A rainbow arched over the pass where Oedipus slew his father. Delphi was one of the last stops on our tour and in every way one of the most spectacular.

Modern Greece was also a big part of the summer. The Greek people are among the most helpful, jovial, and patient in the world. They listened to our Greek with smiling, tolerant amusement and helped us whenever they could. We were given a fair amount of free time so that we could familiarize ourselves with Greece as it is today as well as Greece as it was.

From the moment the ship rounded Ithaca, just appearing in the golden and rosy tints of dawn, until it passed Corfu almost seven weeks later (at midnight during a full eclipse of the full moon!) the summer was an exciting and rewarding experience in a land whose beauty and people I shall always remember with the greatest enthusiasm and affection. Everyone, classicist or not, should include Greece in his itinerary.

The above contests are open only to students in classes in Greek and/or Latin in colleges and universities which have active chapters of Eta Sigma Phi Frater-



Dr. Burns discussed Eta Sigma Phi Scholarships noting that the number of applications had decreased over the last year. Special recognition was given to Miss Jolie T. Siebod, recepient of the scholarship to the American School of Classical Studies in Athens, and Stephen C. Fazio recepient of the scholarship to the American Academy in Rome.

Megas Prytanis Stephen Bumgarner extended an invitation to all the delegates to attend committee meetings to be held from two o'clock until four. Delegates interested in the work of the committees (Auditing, Amendment, Ritual Review, Time and Place, and Resolutions) were encouraged to volunteer their services to the chairman of each of these committees. Stephen also requested those delegates interested in running for a national office to submit their names to the Executive Council before midnight. The meeting was adjourned at 10:25 A.M.

At 2:00 P.M. workshops were held in the Conference Area of the Campus Center. Professor Edith A. M. Kovach conducted a workshop on education; Professor Charles Murphy spoke on life in Greece; Mr. Donald Streibig lectured on contemporary and classical theatre; and Professor Vincent J. Cleary talked on the Aeneid. Regional and Committee meetings were held after the workshops and adjourned at five o'clock.

At 7:00 P.M. the Annual Banquet was held in the Hoernemann Refectory. Prytanis Della Louise Coon acted as hostess and Dr. Leslie H. Fishel, President gave the welcoming address. Following the meal the guest speaker, Professor Clarence A. Forbes of Ohio State University, addressed the convention on Latin in the Middle Ages.

Immediately following Professor Forbes' address delegates were invited to attend any of the campus activities or to gather in the Contemporary Room of the Campus Center. The evening proved to be enjoyable to advisors and delegates alike.

The Second General Session convened on March 11, 1972 at 9:20 A.M. in the Frost Lecture Hall of Bareis Science Hall. Megas Prytanis Stephen Bumgarner accepted the reports of the Regional Chairman.

Megas Hyparchos Alexander Graham, Jr. Chairman of the Auditing Committee reported that the books of the Megal Chrysophylax were found to be in good order. The report of the Chrysophylax was then officially approved as read at the First General Session.

Elizabeth Tanner, Gamma Omicron chapter, Chairman of the Amendments Committee then submitted the findings and suggestions of her committee (Appendix I). The first and second suggestions were accepted as proposed amendments. The third and fourth amendments were defeated and the fifth and sixth were accepted.

The Report of the Ritual Review Committee was then given and discussion followed. It was decided that Pi, Beta Zeta, and Gamma Kappa chapters would write a new ritual and submit it next year.

The Resolutions Committee report was then given and accepted as read.

Jo Kurtz, Gamma Chi Chapter, Chairman of the Time and Place Committee recommended that Millsaps College, Jackson, Mississippi be accepted as the location of the Forty-Fifth National Convention to be held on April 6 and 7, 1973. The report was accepted.

The floor was then opened for new business, but none was introduced.

Professor Theodore Bedrick gave the nomination for the Board of Trustees: Dr. Louise Hoy of Marshall University to replace Sister Mary Isaac Joques. This nomination was accepted.

Megas Prytanis Stephen Bumgarner read the nominations for national officers and nominating and seconding speeches

followed. Then national officers were elected for the year 1972-1973. They are as follows:

APPENDIX I

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON AMENDMENTS

I. The present committee proposes an amendment concerning membership.

The proposed amendment deals specifically with the qualifications for mem- III. The following amendment has been

- ". . . a student must meet the following basic qualifications: an average of not less than a 'B', or in the case of a non-graded system a recommendation from a committee of the faculty of the Classics department and the Dean(s). Such will be obtained after the completion of two term courses above the elementary level or one term course above the intermediate level in Latin and/ or Greek; or at least two term courses in Classics such as literature in translation courses and one term course in Latin or Greek above the elementary level.
- II. The following amendment has been proposed concerning the specification of requirements for the granting of charters to elegible chapters.

"To be eligible for a charter in Eta Sigma Phi a college or university:

- 1. Must be accredited.
- 2. Must have a Classical curriculum.
- 3. Must offer a major in Latin or Greek or both.
- 4. Must have a faculty sufficient to meet the needs of the department.
- 5. Must have some type of organization which has existed for a period of one year consisting of at least five members who meet the requirements of Article XI, Section I. Such organization must submit to the Executive Secretary reports after they have petitioned for a

charter. These reports must be submitted bi-monthly describing their activities.

proposed by the present committee concerning the election of officers:

"The office of National President shall not be held by one chapter in any two successive years."

IV. Also concerning the election of officers, the following amendment has been proposed:

> "No chapter can hold two national offices in the same year."

- V. The present committee has also proposed that the last sentence in Article XIV, Section III which reads: "A National Officer shall be entitled to one vote in his official capacity," be
- VI. We propose that Article XVI, Section I, Paragraph A be changed from "The ... and shall come up for final ..." to read, "An amendment, in order to be proposed, shall be presented in writing at one annual national convention, and if passed by a 2/3 majority of the votes cast, shall be submitted in written form through individual correspondence by the Megas Gramnateus to each chapter at least two months prior to the next annual national convention and shall come up for final . . .'

The Forty-Fourth National Convention voted to have all the proposals except proposals III and IV, brought up for final vote at the Forty-Fifth National Conven-

THE ETA SIGMA PHI SUMMER SCHOLARSHIPS FOR 1973

The Trustees of Eta Sigma Phi Fraternity are pleased to announce that two scholarships will be offered in 1973 to enable one member of Eta Sigma Phi to attend the 1973 Summer Session of the American School of Classical Studies at Athens, Greece, and another to attend the 1973 Summer Session of the American Academy in Rome, Italy.

The Scholarship to the American Academy in Rome will have a value of \$550.00, carrying a stipend of \$350.00 granted by the Trustees of Eta Sigma Phi and remission of the \$200.00 tuition fee by grant of the American Academy.

The Scholarship to the American School of Classical Studies at Athens will have a value of \$600.00, including a stipend of \$300.00 granted by the Trustees of Eta Sigma Phi and remission of the \$300.00 tuition fee by grant of the American School.

Six semester hours of credit may be earned at either summer session, which is applicable toward an advanced degree in Classics at most graduate schools, provided advance arrangements have been made.

Selection of candidates for the scholarships is exercised by the Eta Sigma Phi Scholarship Committee, whose members are Professor Mary Ann Burns of The University of Wisconsin—Milwaukee, Chairman, and Professors Brent M. Froberg of the University of South Dakota, and R. Leon Fitts of Dickinson College. Enquiries and requests for application blanks should be addressed to Professor Mary Ann Burns, Executive Secretary, Department of Classics, The University of Wisconsin—Milwaukee, Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53201.

Eligible to apply for the scholarships are Eta Sigma Phi members and alumni who have received a Bachelor's degree since January 1, 1967 or shall have received it in or before June 1973, and who have not yet received a doctoral degree. In selecting the winner of each scholarship the Committee will give attention to the quality of the applicant's work in Greek and Latin and his intention to teach at the secondary school or college level.

The applicant must submit a transcript of his undergraduate work, letters of recommendation and a statement not to exceed 500 words of his purpose and reasons for desiring the scholarship. Applications must be submitted to Professor Burns by November 15, 1972. The winner of each scholarship will be announced about January 15, 1973.
