CONTESTANNOUNCEMENT

1) THIRTY-FIRST ANNUAL GREEK TRANSLATION CONTEST

This contest will consist of the sight translation of a passage in Greek which is considered within the comprehension of students in the second year or above of the study of Greek.

2) THIRTIETH ANNUAL LATIN TRANSLATION CONTEST

This contest will consist of the sight translation of a passage in Latin chosen in reference to students who have had two or more years of Latin in high school (or the equivalent in college) and at least one or more semesters in college.

3) FOURTEENTH ANNUAL LATIN PROSE COMPOSITION CONTEST

This contest will consist of the translation of a passage of English into Latin. This contest is intended for advanced students of Latin who are in their third or fourth year of college Latin.

PRIZES

First prize in each contest will be \$35.00; second prize \$25.00; and third prize \$15.00.

ELIGIBILITY

The above contests are open only to students in classes in Greek and/or Latin in colleges and universities which have active chapters of Eta Sigma Phi Fraternity.

Written notice of a desire to participate, postmarked not later than January 11, 1980, must be sent to the Executive Secretary, Professor Brent M. Froberg, Department of Classics, University of South Dakota, Vermillion, South Dakota 57069. Materials will be mailed by him in time for the contests to be administered simultaneously in all competing schools during the week of February 4, 1980. Contest papers in all of the above contests are to be forwarded to the Executive Secretary and must be postmarked not later than February 15, 1980. Each paper must be accompanied by an identification page, which will be supplied in advance of the contest. There is a limit of three papers from any one school in each contest.

Decision as to place in the various contests will be made by members of the Eta Sigma Phi Committee on Contests, who will identify the papers by code designation only.

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Salvete Omnes:

Our Fraternity gained a new chapter on May 24, 1979, when I installed by phone, the Epsilon Kappa Chapter at Brigham Young University, Provo, Utah. The National Convention meeting in April in St. Louis had approved the petition submitted by the BYU Classics Club for a charter for their chapter. Eleven charter members were initiated on the night of the Chapter's installation. We extend them every good wish for success, and we rejoice in having a strong, new chapter in the west

We also have a new trustee. Professor Raymond Den Adel, Professor of Classics at Rockford College, Rockford, Illinois, and Executive Secretary of Eta Sigma Phi for four years (1974-1978) has been elected to a three-year term on the Board, Professor Den Adel replaces Professor Bernice Fox who served for three terms on the Board of Trustees. Professor Den Adel, originally initiated by Epsilon Chapter of the University of Iowa, will continue to serve as the chairman of Eta Sigma Phi's Scholarship Committee. Professor Roy Lindahl of Furman University will continue as a member of the Board for another term.

I am pleased to report that two chapters have reactivated during the current year: Alpha Chi at Tulane University and Delta Rho at Radford College. Recently there have been more than the usual number of inquiries about founding new chapters, too.

The National Convention gave lengthy consideration to ways of increasing participation in **the Translation** Contests. **The delegates agreed to** some experimentation in developing a two-tiered competition with one tier for students who have earned fewer credits in Latin and Greek than those students who typically enter the contests now. Since nothing specific was established, Professor Castro's Committee on Contests has the responsibility for setting the criteria for determining eligibility, for selecting passages, and for setting rules. Professor Castro is seeking the help of all chapters. Please take some time and consider carefully the questionnaire included with the copies of the <u>Nuntius</u> sent to each chapter. For this year yet, we shall continue the contests as they have been held in the past; I hope that many of you will participate, since your participation will make you more able to make suggestions to the Contest Committee.

This issue of the <u>Nuntius</u> has no information on medals and their prices. Wildly fluctuating prices for precious metals, especially silver, make it impossible to present an accurate price list. I shall write to those of you who regularly order medals, and I shall publish more information in the next issue of the <u>Nuntius</u>.

Just slightly over \$500 has been added to the Endowment Fund so far this year through personal contributions and gifts from various chapters. I shall publish the names of all contributors in the spring issue, and I shall include the names of any persons or chapters who contribute between now and then. Our thanks go to all who have contributed already.



I had little intention of continuing scholarship in the classics, but 1 felt that a thorough grounding (plus the discipline involved) in the classics would prove valuable to me tn my chosen field, And, I was right. Words became my stock in trade, and my knowledge of Greek has provided me with an invaluable background. If a young person were to ask me today should he study Greek, my answer would be a resounding Yes.

For the past thirty years, almost, I have been in the business world (after graduate school at Columbia University) plying my trade at training and professional development activities. I write and implement programs of personal development in management, human relations, and other business subjects. My work has taken me from the bottom of Chile to the top of Alaska (beyond the Arctic Circle) and into the Arab lands and beyond."

THE ETA SIGMA PHI SUMMER SCHOLARSHIPS FOR 1980

The Trustees of Eta Sigma Phi Fraternity are pleased to announce that two scholarships will be offered in 1980 to enable one member of Eta Sigma Phi to attend the 1980 Summer Session of the American School of Classical Studies at Athens, Greece, and another to attend the 1980 Summer Session of the American Academy in Rome, Italy.

The Scholarship to the American Academy in Rome will have a value of \$1200.00 which includes the tuition fee remitted by the American Academy.

The Scholarship to the American School of Classical Studies at Athens will have a value of \$1400.00 which includes the tuition fee remitted by the American School.

At either summer session, six semester hours of credit may be earned which is applicable toward an advanced degree in Classics at most graduate schools, provided that advance arrangements have been made.

Selection of candidates for the scholarships is exercised by the Eta Sigma Phi Scholarship Committee whose members are Professors Raymond L. Den Adel of Rockford College, Chairman, Justin Glenn of Florida State University, and Carrie Cowherd of Howard University. Enquiries and requests for blanks should be addressed to Professor Raymond L. Den Adel, Department of Classics, Rockford College, Rockford, Illinois, 61101.

Eligible to apply for the scholarships are Eta Sigma Phi members and alumni who have received a Bachelor's degree since January I, 1974, or shall have received it in or before June 1980, and who have not yet received a doctoral degree. In selecting the winner of each scholarship the Committee will give attention to the quality of the applicant's work in Greek and Latin and his intention to teach at the secondary school or college level.

The applicant must submit a transcript of his undergraduate work, letters of recommendation, and a statement not to exceed 500 words of his purpose and reasons for desiring the scholarship. Applications must be submitted to Professor Den Adel by December 16, 1979. The winner of each scholarship will be announced about January 15, 1980.
